 At the February 13, 2017 Advisory Council meeting: Council members suggested that the next narrowing down decisions for NWMO will be more challenging noting that if a community exits the process as a potential host, they may remain in the process as part of a broader siting region. 	Agree. Communities that exit as a host will be moved to "neighbouring community" status if their broader siting region continues in the process. As such, they will continue to be invited to participate in siting decisions in the area. They will continue to receive funding, although at the lower level of the neighbouring community program.	
 A Council member also noted that benefits received by communities in other similar international projects will shape expectations for NWMO's siting communities and NWMO should be prepared for this. 	NWMO is tracking similar international programs as potential benchmarks which communities may apply in the future. NWMO is developing programs in the context of a made in Canada program driven by values and principles already built in to the APM program.

At the September 18, 2017 Advisory Council Meeting		
A Council member cautioned that in preparing for borehole drilling, First Nations communities may need a longer period to prepare for this and may suffer "process fatigue" with fewer resources available, particularly in Southern Ontario where they are also dealing with the OPG L&ILW DGR project. Council members also asked about the process for land acquisition in the various areas.	 We are hearing comments about process fatigue, including from First Nations in Southern Ontario where there are several nuclear related projects currently being discussed. We are also hearing about process fatigue from municipalities in areas. Strategy and plans are being developed to mitigate the "process fatigue" issue and guide land acquisition activities in both southern and northern Ontario. NWMO will share work in progress with the Council at a future meeting.

	basis meeting with community leadership, staff, community groups and a cross-section of opinion leaders to understand the questions and concerns which may be emerging and to work with community members to respond to them.
	 A focus over several years on community learning about the project, used fuel, safety and risks is expected to help communities build resilience.
	NWMO is also working to broaden and deepen support around these communities, including through work with municipal associations, treaty organizations, briefings with government at provincial and national levels and an expanding social media program.
